Gospel Reading - Luke 12:13-21

Someone in the crowd said to him, 'Teacher, tell my brother to divide the family inheritance with me.' But he said to him, 'Friend, who set me to be a judge or arbitrator over you?' And he said to them, 'Take care! Be on your guard against all kinds of greed; for one's life does not consist in the abundance of possessions.' Then he told them a parable: 'The land of a rich man produced abundantly. And he thought to himself, "What should I do, for I have no place to store my crops?" Then he said, "I will do this: I will pull down my barns and build larger ones, and there I will store all my grain and my goods. And I will say to my soul, Soul, you have ample goods laid up for many years; relax, eat, drink, be merry." But God said to him, "You fool! This very night your life is being demanded of you. And the things you have prepared, whose will they be?" So it is with those who store up treasures for themselves but are not rich towards God.'

Pilgrimage to Walsingham - Friday 15th - Monday 18th July

A group of pilgrims from St Augustine Whitton and St Mary's Sunbury led by Fr. Simon Lane travelled to Walsingham to visit the Shrine of Our Lady of Walsingham.

This year the shrine of Our Lady of Walsingham in Norfolk celebrates the centenary of its existence on the present site. St Augustine's have had a long tradition of visiting the shrine and indeed have a close connection in the form of the late Fr. Beaumont Lauder Brandie, one time curate at St Augustine's in the early 1970s.

It is an experience which has much to commend itself. On Saturday evening is the pilgrims mass for all the visiting groups followed by the candle lit procession of Our Lady in the grounds, Benediction, and a service of laying on of hands and healing for those who wish it. On Sunday we have our own mass at 8am and in the afternoon we are all sprinkled with holy water from the Well and join the procession of the Blessed Sacrament in the grounds followed by Benediction. Stations of the cross on Sunday evening around the grounds is blissfully peaceful as many pilgrim groups have gone home. On our last day, Monday, we have our own mass at 8am and a final prayer of farewell before setting off home around 10am.

Besides all the shrine services and processions there is plenty of time to sit or wander and admire the beautiful gardens or join your fellow pilgrims in the well stocked bar. There are plenty of interesting walks in the area, particularly along a disused part of the railway line to the Roman Catholic shrine.



Richard Norris Remembered



It goes without saying that Richard was a very committed member of St Augustine who never missed a worship service or church function unless he was out of town. Richard would rather be late than missing anything.

St Augustine church community was part of his family as Richard was part of St Augustine community. This was demonstrated in so many ways including his practice of writing one greeting card to the whole church community at

special feasts such as Easter and Christmas.

As I started my ministry during lockdown, I only started to know Richard well after the lockdown when meeting up became possible. I took keen interest in him and after some persuasion I managed to get an invitation to visit his home, a week or so before he travelled to spend Christmas with his brother John and sister-in-law Elizabeth.

It was on Friday morning after Holy Communion service when Richard took me to his house. We spent time together in his house learning about him and his life and family. We also talked about how we could work together to clear the back garden of his house.

That very day we decided to go to the High Street for lunch. We were welcomed in Café Venice and had such a wonderful time of fellowship and laughter over a lovely meal. I asked Richard to order anything he wanted to eat and a drink of his choice,

which he did and got himself a beer while asking, "Are you sure Fr John I should get a beer?", and of course my answer was an obvious "yes, go for it."

On that day we agreed to have another meal together after Easter, but my health situation after Easter never allowed for that second meal to happen.

We are thankful for the person Richard was and the richness of his humanity and faith, and the privilege we had of sharing in his life.

Richard was a blessed person who became a blessing to many of us. He was a gentle and caring person, intelligent, and certainly a person of strong faith.

The memories shared in this publication attest to that. RIP.

To many people I am known as Connie but Richard would always call me 'Constance'

He was such a gentleman this was witnessed daily when entering the church door, he would let other people go in first.

Richard was a very kind man, he was always worried about his brother and sister in law. He told me he needed to help them as much as he can because of their health.

On many occasions we would walk home together after church service. He would make sure I am safe, therefore he would wait until I have boarded the bus, then he would go home on his own. Little did he know that I was more worried about him going home alone. But Richard would reassure me that he would be alright.

Richard was very intelligent and yet modest. One would always learn something new from him. He was well informed.

He made sure that he never missed church services when he was around, it being day or evening services.

He would many times be late but would nevertheless be there.

(he would rather be late than never) He was a staunch believer.

The last days of his life, I didn't see him in church but inner me said, I am sure he will turn up, he is probably running late.

But Richard was no more!

Richard was a man of faith. He helped my faith grow.

I feel blessed that I got to know Richard as a friend.

He touched everyone 's life in different ways.

Go well true friend. We will miss you but will meet again. May your Soul Rest in Peace.

He was unstinting in his loyalty to the Group and never missed a walk unless he was away out of the area. He used to interrogate me in the Hall after church as to where the next walk would be held and the route, the likely weather and the logistics of the walk, as he longed for the informal human contact that the Group afforded him. He wanted to be with kindred spirits but not reveal too much of himself, and he would seek to achieve acceptance by being the physical equal of a group that being Christian, accepted him without question, Church activities and particularly walking, supplied the ideal mix of what made him tick. He used to thank me profusely after

each walk and say how keenly he was looking forward to the next outing. The members of the Group welcomed his participation and realised how much he appreciated the company, fresh air and conversation that walking offered him. Until a few months before his demise he was remarkably fit, walking 5 or 6 miles with no complaints.

He had an uncanny compass and sense of location - I recall how one day we walked in Richmond Park but he failed to join us at the station for the start of the walk. We concluded that he had been taken ill or was elsewhere until he surprised us by turning up at our coffee stop unannounced at about midday and in a matter of fact way said he knew where we'd be!!

He also took a very full part in the house to house collections for Christian Aid until we ceased doing this in 2016 or thereabouts. He worked many of the roads in the Woodlawn area and came away with some very decent totals collected.

Richard loved walking at dusk which is a time I am drawn to as well. We always shared our love of nature and he always impressed me with his knowledge of so many subjects.
